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Dr. René Caissie: maxillofacial surgeon and inventor



His name comes to mind when we speak of Sacré-Cœur's caring experts: maxillofacial surgeon Dr. René Caissie.

His **first** brush with the media glare was during an appearance on the talk show Tout le monde en parle way back in April. In his tinkering, he came up with a type of mask/balaclava—a prototype—that is now manufactured by CCM.

The **second time** came 15 days later for customized masks made using 3D printing, a technology that makes it possible to "build" objects using synthetic materials layered through small jets of fluid, based on a template stored in an electronic file. Such masks can be sterilized and reused; they simply require occasionally changing an easily available and inexpensive filter. The mask drew 10,000 inquiries from health care professionals.

In June, Dr. Caissie made headlines a **third time**. Partnering with two Quebec companies and the National Research Council of Canada (NRC), his own laboratory, Dorma Filtration, developed a reusable and disposable generic N95 mask equivalent to the one used by health workers. A hospital typically uses and discards tens, perhaps even hundreds, of thousands of them annually, and their cost has skyrocketed as a result of the pandemic. According to NRC research officer Mihaela Mihai, Dr. Caissie's mask is unique in the world. It functions like the classic disposable N95 mask and comes in three models, with design based on anthropometric data from the NRC. Made from biocompatible polymers, it is easily washable and can be inexpensively mass produced. It's a safe bet that we will be hearing about Dr. René Caissie once again in the very near future.

SURGERY IN THE COVID-19 ERA REQUIRES CAREFUL CONSIDERATION AND PLENTY OF PRECAUTIONS

Montreal's Sacré-Cœur Hospital has seen a great many things within its walls. It is one of the Montreal hospitals designated to receive confirmed COVID-19 cases. Just imagine the complex logistics and all the precautions required to perform surgery on a person suspected or confirmed as having COVID-19. Such a case occurred in early May for a laparotomy. The surgery took place in operating room 17 during the night. A laparotomy is among those types of surgery that risk generating aerosols (droplets that remain suspended in the air) if an intervention in the intestines is required.

Moving and handling a patient with COVID-19 or suspected of having it requires focus and clear thinking. **The surgery protocol was respected to the letter**. This meant a glove change each time the patient's immediate environment was touched; the removal of personal protective equipment without any team member being contaminated; the two case managers in close collaboration with the surgeons,

anesthesiologist, respiratory therapist, attendants and nurses. The personnel took all the necessary precautions and the entire team is very proud of their performance. It is worth noting that such a surgical procedure is not only stressful, but lengthy and difficult for all the team members.

SACRÉ-CŒUR HOSPITAL IS IN FULL TRANSFORMATION

We have major projects underway and we need you more than ever. These projects must move ahead rapidly. The COVID-19 crisis has shown us the importance of executing them without delay and the need to transform the environment of the Hospital's key facilities. To do this, we need your support.



THE PROJECT FOR THE NEW INTEGRATED RENAL SUPPORT CENTRE

Our CIUSSS's principal hemodialysis centre has been located at the former main entrance of Sacré-Coeur, on the second floor of wing G. Over the past 30 years, the number of treatment stations has gradually increased to reach today's maximum capacity of 27 stations.

The increase in demand in recent years has meant that the physical space available is insufficient. The water system, for its part, has reached the end of its useful life. However, the complexity of replacing it within the space allocated to dialysis while we are operational makes the task practically impossible. That is why the new Integrated Renal Centre will be built in another wing. It will improve the accessibility of dialysis services for the Hospital's clientele and optimize the space reserved for treatment. A capital project for the patients of course, but also for the entire team of Nephrology Service.





TWO MODULAR UNITS UNDER CONSTRUCTION

The pandemic has brought its share of emotion and uncertainty and challenged us to adapt, but it has also stimulated innovation and forced us to push beyond our personal limits. A case in point is the Hospital's real estate directorate, which was called upon to reorganize, relocate, install, move and build. To prepare for a second wave of infection while making it possible to resume suspended activities as soon as possible, we chose to install two modular units in the Hospital's parking lot. This solution allowed us to add 96 short-stay beds, enabling the resumption of 70% of medical activities and of at least 50% of surgical procedures.

The project's scope is impressive:

- Simultaneous design and construction
- On-site assembly
- Annexation to the main building on two floors
- Connection to all technical services
- Works limited to 5 months
