50 years of a university mission supported by the Foundation

In 2023, the Foundation was very happy to join with the Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital's research centre and the Teaching Expertise Centre to take part in festivities related to the **50-year affiliation with the Université de Montréal**. The devotion and passion of everyone who makes this university research and teaching mission a daily reality is an enormous source of inspiration.

Let's remember that our Foundation was born in 1976, a few years after the affiliation was created. Its creation was in great part needed to support this university mission, which was an addition to the health care services offered to the entire community.

Since then, over the years, more than \$27 million has been distributed to support the work of researchers and students, as well as to provide the equipment needed for research and teaching. To that can be added \$17 million invested through medical funding for research projects in specific sectors, and for research and teaching chairs. Often, the Foundation serves as a springboard, enabling research groups to also obtain other bursaries and research funds.

Through its annual activities, each year the Foundation distributes an amount ranging between four and six million dollars to the two hospitals it supports: Sacré-Cœur and Albert-Prévost. Of this amount, approximately \$1.3 million is granted for research, while the rest is invested in a variety of projects and the purchase of high-tech equipment.

This substantial support for research will continue in the coming years with our major funding campaign: Let's change lives together. One of the projects of the Capital Campaign is to establish a Research Chair in Artificial Intelligence, which will provide unpredicted scientific breakthroughs. You will learn more about our investments in 2023 on the pages of this Report.

We'd like to thank everyone who, through your donations, contributes to advancing care and treatment at Sacré-Cœur and Albert-Prévost and our grand university mission.




A bit of history

Catherine Duclos

Catherine Duclos is a researcher at the Integrated Trauma Centre (CIT) and at the Centre for Advanced Research in Sleep Medicine. After completing an Honours Bachelor's degree in Anthropology at McGill University in 2009, Dr. Duclos completed a master's-in-passing to a Ph.D. in biomedical sciences at Université de Montréal, supervised by Nadia Gosselin and Marie Dumont, two highly celebrated sleep researchers. Since January 2022, Catherine Duclos has been leading a research program at Sacré-Cœur. It focuses on altered states of consciousness during critical care and surgery, emphasizing, in particular, comas, disorders of consciousness, sleep and anesthesia.




Dr. Yiorgos Alexandros Cavayas

Dr. Yiorgos Alexandros Cavayas is an intensive-care doctor at Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital. His work includes examining how pulmonary and extracorporeal gas exchanges can affect the brain. Currently, most of his work uses data from the United States. Given this situation, Dr. Cavayas, in collaboration with his colleagues, initiated a project to organize and use local health data. His project to store traumatology and intensive care data, in collaboration with Louis De Beaumont (director of fundamental and translational research), received approval from a consortium of public and private partners. Partners include the Quebec Ministry of the Economy, innovation and energy, making it a major project. This will increase the profile of our Research Centre among health care institutions in the country.



Dr. Andrée-Ann Baril

Independent researcher Dr. Andrée-Ann Baril is trained in neurology, epidemiology, psychiatry and genetics. Throughout her career, Dr. Baril has studied sleep medicine for the elderly. She is a member of the Centre for Advanced Research in Sleep Medicine, where she is researching the role of sleep disorders such as insomnia in the development of Alzheimer's disease. Dr. Baril is a member of several major research groups, in Canada and abroad, which concentrate on sleep and dementia research.



Our experts are being noticed

Our Hospital under the spotlight!

A first for hemodynamics in Quebec

Deployed for the first time in Quebec at the Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital in early 2023, a new artificial-intelligence-driven hemodynamic technology means that obstructed coronary arteries can now be unblocked more quickly and more precisely.

Optical coherence tomography (OCT) has been used for about a decade. The technique uses light and a tiny camera inserted in the artery to measure blockage. This helps the interventional cardiologist to determine the measures needed. The new technology adds artificial intelligence modules to the system for a more refined analysis of the artery walls. It also provides finer detection of calcification, which could be missed by the doctor.

"It's a very interesting technological advance because we use the power of artificial intelligence combined with the imaging resolution offered by OCT to enter the 21st century regarding coronary procedures," explains Dr. Erick Schampaert, head of cardiology for CIUSSS du Nord-de-l'Île-de-Montréal.

In a context of chronically overcrowded operating rooms, the first benefit of the new technology will be to shorten the time taken for each procedure, which may lead to one or two more procedures done each day.

Most importantly, added Dr. Schampaert, the system practically guarantees optimal results for each intervention.

Two Sacré-Cœur surgeons create a new, encouraging surgical procedure

In December 2023, two Sacré-Cœur Hospital surgeons, Dr. William Fortin and Dr. Marina Ibrahim brought a glimmer of hope to certain patients whose heart is judged to be too weak to risk open-heart surgery. Deployment of a new, relatively complex, technique which they were the first in Quebec to use, can treat aneurysms and aortic dissections, without exposing patients to open-heart surgery. This technique provides two benefits to patients: reduced operating risks and shortened convalescence time.

An additional option

Until now, some patients had no other option available. "This means we can now treat patients under all sorts of scenarios, with all sorts of anatomies, as well as in emergency situations with prostheses to which we already had access," explained Dr. Fortin. A vascular and endovascular surgeon, in an article published in L'Actualité shortly after the procedure.

The first patient to benefit from it in Quebec went home 48 hours after the intervention, instead of the usual 7–10 day hospital stay needed with the classic operating technique. "This represents major technical and professional progress," indicates cardiac surgeon Dr. Marina Ibrahim. "It worked, and we can start using the technique for several other patients."

3D filming of a delicate surgical procedure for training

Canadian Press article, published by Radio Canada International

In July 2023, a delicate surgical procedure was filmed in 3D at Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital, with the purpose of creating a virtual reality environment. Initially it will be used for training but someday it may also be used to provide remote assistance. This was explained in a Canadian Press article published on July 28, 2023. During this event, to which Canadian Press had exclusive access, technicians from the Abbott company were on hand to film the procedure directed by cardiac electrophysiologist Alexios Hadjis. The goal was to correct ventricular tachycardia in a 67-year-old patient. Dr. Hadjis is one of the only Canadian physicians trained in correcting ventricular tachycardia; he travels across the country.

He recently went to Newfoundland to conduct an operation — a long trip for a four-to-five-hour procedure; it represents a suboptimal use of his time. The recording done by Abbot at Sacré-Cœur should facilitate the training of new specialists, in Canada and across the world, by allowing them to virtually enter the hospital electrophysiology lab. They will only need to put on a virtual reality helmet to see everything Dr. Hadjis and his team saw at the time of the recording and, especially, they will be able to learn the ablation technique used to address the ventricular tachycardia.

We support mental health



One initiative the Foundation has supported since 2020 is the **Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) mental** health program. Intended for adults presenting with serious mental issues and high instability, this program offers treatment, support in their re-establishment and to help increase their autonomy and integration into society.

Among the methods used, ACT provides a program of social outings funding by the Foundation from donations it collects. ACT clients of all ages, situations and backgrounds can participate in a variety of activities, such as a sugar shack visit, a trip to La Ronde, a barbecue beside a lake or a hike in Mount Royal Park.

"These group outings are determinative for our users suffering from schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, or generalized anxiety disorder resistant to treatment," states Élyse Benoit, psychoeducator and ACT unit head. These activities break down isolation, and help people to overcome their fears and discover new interests. They also promote the creation of friendships.

Leisure activities offer an opening: users – whom we consider to be full citizens – can finally have fun and nourish the hope of living a normal life by participating more in their community."

Restoring a zest for life

ACT provides a multidisciplinary team that include a psychiatrist, nurses, and addiction and social redintegration specialists. It also offers support for activities of day-to-day life, including housecleaning, shopping, paying rent and interacting with neighbours. "Some people are sufficiently independent, others require help that entails four to six interventions per week, or support for the family. Our services lead to results," beams Élyse Benoit.

Proof: thanks to ACT's personalized and unlimited support, several people affected by incapacitating mental problems have found a job, gone back to school or re-entered the job market. For example, one young woman paralyzed by social phobias is about to complete her Secondary V year and plans to study nursing.

"That's not an isolated case," states the unit head and psychoeducator. "I am also thinking of that former top student and sports champion who spent his youth in a basement developing an addiction to video games and drugs. After drafting an intensive intervention plan, which got him out of into the world, first by helping him conquer his fears of being outside through short walks in his neighbourhood, then by taking him to a climbing centre. We were able to take him on group outings. This was a trigger to get him to open up to others! He still talks about his visit to the sugar shack." Of course the expert underlines that outings do not solve everything. But they greatly help give clients points of reference and solid connections that help them accept their illness and to see a future.

An important fact: for a clientele with very fragile mental health status, participation in the ACT program reduces hospitalizations and ER admissions by half. Finally, as Élyse Benoit points out, ACT users know that funds for their group outings do not come from the Hospital, but from donors who believe in helping their development. "This really has an impact. Such generosity shows them that they deserve to be contacted, they deserve to be pulled out of their dark, empty and smoky studio apartment so they can join in high-quality social activities. It's a very important recognition of their existence." It's also a helping hand extended into a world that really needs it. Many thanks to everyone who donates to this hyper-essential service.

Charlotte Tassé's wonderful legacy, immortalized at the Albert-Prévost Mental Health Hospital!



We chose National Nursing Week, observed May 8–14, 2023, to name one of the wings of the Albert-Prévost Mental Health Hospital in honour of Charlotte Tassé and to unveil a permanent exhibition that presents her accomplishments.

Charlotte Tassé was a true pioneer in her field. She devoted her life to uniting, training, promoting and recognizing auxiliary nurses in French Canada, known as garde-malades (care-attendants) at the time.

The exhibition, designed by Cinq Cinq Studio, was unveiled in front of Charlotte Tassé's grand-niece, Johanne Tassé who collaborated in the documentation of this wonderful story. Also in attendance were dignitaries, members of the Albert-Prévost Mental Health Hospital team, and Alexandre Klein, who holds a doctorate in the history and philosophy of science from the University of Ottawa; his research made this recognition possible.

Charlotte Tassé left her mark

Among Charlotte Tassé's many accomplishments, we want to mention the opening in 1950 of Quebec's first school for auxiliary nurses, in response to an issue that is still a problem: a lack of caregivers. "It is impossible to leave unsaid the fact that we owe the creation of this profession entirely to Madame Tassé. Throughout her life, she worked for the recognition of French-Canadian auxiliary nurses and for their importance in Quebec's health care system," notes Adélaïde de Melo, CEO of the CIUSSS NÎM.

Thanks to Charlotte Tassé, the Albert-Prévois Sanitarium became the first hospital in Quebec, and even in Canada, to be managed by lay auxiliary nurses, with a Board of Directors made up entirely of women. Madame Tassé left an immense legacy. This wing, as well as the permanent exhibition, recognizes the importance of her contribution

to the Albert-Prévost Mental Health Hospital, and to the auxiliary-nursing and nursing professions. A biography of Charlotte Tassé, written by Alexandre Klein, is scheduled to appear this year.

"I feel privileged to be here today for this beautiful event that commemorates the work of a great lady, Charlotte Tassé," said the Foundation CEO, Paul Bergeron. "I am sure that if she were still with us, given her determination to improve care, she would have long since started knocking at the door of my office to ask for help from the Foundation. I would have been very happy to have made the acquaintance of someone so involved in this work."

Since creation of the Foundation, in 1976, more than \$1.2 million has been invested in various projects for mental health. Other funds collected have been allocated for mental health research and programs like music and Assertive Community Treatment (ACT). This commitment to increasing support for mental health is also reflected in the Foundation's current capital funding campaign. One of its projects is improvement to the reception and emergency facilities at the Albert-Prévost Mental Health Hospital.

Remarkable support since 1976

More than \$97 million for care and to support the university mission

Thanks to various fundraising campaigns, solicitations, benefit events, fundraisers and especially to the great generosity of our donors, since it was founded in 1976, the Foundation has raised more than just the \$97 million it has given to the Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital and the Albert-Prévost Mental Health Hospital. This amount, although impressive, does not take into account donations received for specific projects or commitments for the purchase of equipment as yet not completed or used. In addition, the Foundation created an endowment fund several years ago, the assets of which are invested in accordance with our investment policy. Its goal is to ensure the sustainability of the Foundation. The Hospital's sectors of excellence are strongly supported by the Foundation, as is the university mission (research and teaching).

\$5,686,627 in 2023 to support the development of Sacré-Cœur and Albert-Prévost

In 2023, thanks to our annual collections, benefit events, and individual fundraising initiatives, almost \$5.7 million was given to our two hospitals to purchase equipment, and support research and teaching. To this amount must be added all the funds collected and set aside for specific projects that will be completed in the coming months and years, commitments made and donations related to the capital fundraising campaign.

Here is a summary of the allocation of the \$5,686,627 invested in 2023:

- > More than \$3 million for a new hemodynamics room;
- More than \$1.5 million to support the Research Centre, in particular for orthopaedics, traumatology and sleep disorders;
- More than \$500,000 for advanced medical training of specialist physicians, including in pneumology, orthopaedics and traumatology.



Since 2018, the Foundation has provided an annual budget allocation for the purchase of small equipment used on the care units.

In 2023, an amount of \$84,072 was used to acquire equipment such as medical carts, an occupational therapy computer system, a bronchial clearing device in pneumology, a Gamma probe and a screen for the operating theatre.

New commitments

Thanks to our new distribution policy for our portfolio performance and implementation of a priorities committee with the participation of administrative and medical management for our two hospitals, the Foundation pledged in 2023 to provide financial support of \$1,500,427 for upcoming projects and equipment purchase, in particular in the otorhinolaryngology and gastroenterology sectors.

Better equipment for gastroenterology

This new process means going ahead with the purchase of echo-endoscopy equipment and a Fibroscan probe in the amount of \$597,400. The field of echo-endoscopy evolves rapidly. According to Dr. Marcel Tomaszewski, advanced endoscopy gastro-enterologist, investment in this equipment will undoubtedly enhance the renown of Sacré-Cœur Hospital, and more importantly will address a variety of digestive health problems in patients who are not candidates for surgery or are suffering from advanced cancer.

The two linear echoendoscopes acquired will improve the digestive endoscopy intervention program and it will be possible to conduct some of the most cutting-edge techniques, such as echo-endoscopic gall bladder drainage.

The Fibroscan is an examination of the liver using an ultrasound probe. This examination is a non-invasive way to determine if a patient has liver fibrosis or cirrhosis (liver scarring), avoiding the need for a liver biopsy.

Preparing for the arrival of the PET-CT camera

Modernization of the Nuclear Medicine Department at Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital began in March 2023, with a 2025 completion date. This upgrade work is essential, and will allow the installation of a new device for PET-CT (positron emission tomography-computed tomography) exams.

The new device will provide access for the best diagnostic services for cancer and chronic diseases to people living in the area covered by CIUSSS du Nord-de-l'Île-de-Montréal. This will help to choose the best treatment plan for our users.

Modernization will add comfortable, light-filled, soothing, safe and efficient spaces to the Hospital. The highest quality of health care, services, teaching and research facilities will be provided. Three successive managers of the Nuclear Medicine Department were very active in this project: Dr. Martin Veilleux, Dr. Valérie Levert and Dr. Mathieu Charest multiplied the meetings and reached out to their milieu to make people understand the importance of making this project happen.

The Foundation collected \$3 million to purchase equipment. The project started 13 years after the funding campaign led by nucleologists. The budget for modernizing the entire Nuclear Medicine Department by the Ministry of Health and Social Services was more than \$41 million. The new construction will cover an area five times greater than the current building. The construction site is located in the back portion of Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital, where an additional floor is being built on Aile P.



In addition to making significant changes throughout the Department, the new PET-CT zone will comprise a shielded room equipped with a latest generation, five-ring **PET-CT** camera, a laboratory for preparing radioactive materials, five injection rooms, a radiation therapy room and two waiting rooms.



A database to help our specialists in decision-making

In 2023, a Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital Research Centre team obtained \$2 million from a consortium of public and private partners to create a single bank for intensive-care data, a veritable data warehouse.

Interest in this unique project is growing with other companies becoming interested and wanting to support the project, which will better respond to the needs of patients and their families. While other databanks of this sort exist, ours is different because of the impressive number of brain images that it contains.

This medical databank includes data collected from all care episodes, whether lasting a few hours or extending over months. The data have been compiled on a platform which provides real-time analysis of the primary indicators to help

medical decision-making, including diagnosis, prognosis and treatment. The platform, based on artificial intelligence, allows for rapid diagnosis and suggests appropriate care for patients in record time, with great accuracy. This is a great benefit for the clinical teams.


Louis De Beaumont was one of the three researchers who launched the project, with Dr. Yiorgos Alexandros Cavayas and Dr. Martin Albert. In 2023, the Foundation pledged a \$50,000 investment to support this work so that care teams could be kept up to date with the most recent knowledge in intensive care.

The availability of this platform has placed our establishment in what is a unique position with regard to traumatology scientific innovation and care in Canada. Moreover, the Quebec government, through the Ministry of Economy, Innovation and Energy, has recognized our unique status of excellence and continues to propel this enhancement by providing funding for this initiative. This major subsidy will help make Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital trauma care technologies a model for all of Quebec."

Inspiring stories

Staunch support

It will soon be 20 years since Éric Quenneville began to provide monthly donations to the Sacré-Cœur Hospital Foundation A traditionalist, as he says himself, loyalty is a fundamental value for him. "I've been solicited by other institutions but I prefer to give to the place that, twice, has preserved my quality of life," states this 58-year-old dental technician.

His first experience with the Hospital was in his early 20s, when he was still a student. An enthusiastic athlete, he suffered a serious injury during a baseball game. The diagnosis? Injury to the two cruciate ligaments of the knee, requiring urgent surgery. On the insistence of his sister, a physiotherapist, he turned to Sacré-Cœur Hospital and received "the best care there is".

The fact that the Hospital was a university institution at the cutting edge of technology also played a part in the patient's decision. "The operation went very well. I remember that an intern assisted. Afterwards, I did physio at the hospital clinic, where treating staff helped me regain my muscular strength, balance and stability," he remembers. "I had major scars – since at the time arthroscopic surgery wasn't available – but the tear healed."

His story does not end there. In 2005, Mr. Quenneville developed a very painful L4-L5 lumbar herniated disk. "The pressure caused by the slipped disks on the roots of my nerves was so intense and painful that I couldn't function at all. And then," he emphasizes, "I could become incontinent." Surgery was absolutely necessary. But it would be difficult, delicate and... risky. "The doctors explained that there was about a 30% chance of success, a 30% chance it wouldn't work and a 30% chance it would make my situation worse." In short, a throw of the dice.

Resolving to heal, and reassured by the success of his first orthopaedic procedure, he decided to go under the knife. "I had no choice! I couldn't continue like that," he concluded. He had two young children and wanted to be able to hold them in his arms. "In addition," he said with conviction. "I felt I was in good hands with the care team."

His courage and optimism were proved right. The precise expertise of his surgeon allowed him to go back to work and resume his activities, including hockey. However, the rehabilitation process needed a long time. "It took years, lots of effort, stretching and other exercise to protect my back. Today, I think I've regained 90% of my capacities. I can't run or lift heavy loads, but I still live a normal life. I'm very grateful." In the same breath, he says: "I had no idea how much the procedure cost, but I was pretty sure it was very high. That's when I realized the need to become a donor."

In his eyes, no matter the amount donated, what is important is to contribute according to your means. "The more that many people contribute, the more our health care system can go further and provide excellent services. You know," he energetically concludes, "We can do exceptional procedures in Quebec. To me, becoming a monthly Sacré-Cœur donor long ago, was also a way to express my confidence in our medical expertise."

Move to action and pay it forward

There are as many different reasons to express gratitude as there are donors. For François Morin, a 62-year-old early retiree, the need to help save lives is his motivation. In 2019, following repeated bleeding, he underwent a colonoscopy at Sacré-Cœur Hospital. Nothing alarming on its own. But, just a few minutes after the examination, he learned he was suffering from colorectal cancer.

"The effect was a total surprise," recounts the former vehicle fleet repair manager. "Fortunately, they immediately started my treatment. A few days before my operation, a nurse explained the procedures for my temporary stoma. It was major surgery but it went well and I recovered easily. The fact I was at a healthy weight, did sports and was in good physical condition," he thinks "undoubtedly contributed to my being able to go home more quickly than expected."

Not to mention that Mr. Morin adopted a positive attitude from the beginning of treatment for his disease. "I had stage 2 cancer, not very advanced. And statistics were on my side since 90% of people at this stage recover. So I had every reason to stay optimistic. Of course, I suffered some distress, but I did oral chemotherapy without feeling any side effects. I consider myself lucky!" exclaims Mr. Morin. He also received radiation treatments at Hôpital Maisonneuve-Rosemont, to reduce the risk of the cancer recurring.

However, a few weeks after the surgery, and unexpected complication took him back to the Sacré-Cœur ER. A portion of his intestine had moved from its normal location and was protruding through the stoma (called a "prolapse"). With reduced blood flow, the exposed portion of the organ could suffer necrosis. Time was of the essence. "I was operated on during the night. I was very worried, but they quickly reassured me. And everything went well," he explains with a sigh of relief.

Since then, he has healed, and gradually adapted to the changes required by his new way of life. And there seems to be good news regarding remission. "I have one remaining follow-up visit with my hematologist-oncologist, and that's it. I hope the news will be reassuring!"

This donor is very grateful and offers lavish praise to the specialists who cared for him on his path to health. "I have only good things to say about the two surgeons who operated on me, and for my hematology-oncologist, Dr. Isabelle Gigras — kind and exceptional specialists. I also want to salute the work of the other hospital staff who were always responsive and considerate. I was really well taken care of at Sacré-Cœur!" he states gratefully.

To show concrete support for the Hospital, Mr. Morin chose to make a donation of publicly listed shares. This method provides significant tax advantages because his capital gains on the shares are not subject to income tax. "By choosing the best performing securities in my portfolio, I could be more generous without having to spend more money."

In his opinion, if you want to improve our health care system, you have to support research. "That being said," he laments, "it's hard to convince people that haven't experienced illness to donate. They think cancer won't touch them. In reality," he says, his voice choking, "it affects millions of people who need cutting-edge care to survive." He's living proof.

Ten years for the Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital Foundation Art Collection

Self-portrait at the stethoscope

This year (2023) marked the tenth anniversary of the art collection displayed on the walls of Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital and Albert-Prévost Mental Health Hospital. If we count all the patients, staff and visitors over a decade, a great many people have been touched by this project.

In the book Autoportrait au radiateur (self-portrait at the radiator),¹ The name of this article was inspired by the book title. Christian Bobin writes: "A book, a real book is not someone who speaks to us, it is someone who hears us, who knows how to hear us." Like a work of art, we could say. If we were to place a stethoscope on this collection, what would we hear? Heartbeats, certainly, since everything started with a breath, an inspiration, and a beating heart.

Breath

The Collection's origins intersect with the story of two Sacré-Cœur patients: François-Xavier Marange and François Blais. An artistic engraver, Marange is one of the linchpins of the Atelier Circulaire, an artists' centre for fine printmaking. He was also one of the artists invited by Dr. Jean-Luc Malo, Sacré-Cœur pulmonologist, to create an engraving for a pneumology research convention. The theme dealt with breath and respiration. A few years later, when Marange learned that he had lung cancer, it was natural that he would turn to Dr. Malo. As for François Blais, he was being treated for colon and liver cancer over many years François is the brother of Simon Blais, co-owner with Sylvie Cataford, of the Galerie Simon Blais, which represents Marange.

During visits to Sacré-Cœur Hospital, Sylvie Cataford and Simon Blais were upset by the bare walls. For them, artwork was always an "investment" in happiness and quality of life. From this sprang the idea of installing art at Sacré-Cœur Hospital. To make things happen, they called upon three people. The first was Dr. Malo, the ideal person internally. Not only was he the physician treating Marange, he is also an art lover.

Inspiration

The two other people to whom Simon Blais appealed were Earl Pinchuk and Gary Blair, of the Art for Healing Foundation. The gallerist was quite familiar with this Foundation because he had been donating art to it since its creation in 2022. The mission of this Foundation is to provide inspiring environments, bring hope and serenity to patients, staff and visitors through the healing power of art.

Initially, art collectors Pinchuk and Blair had thought about opening an art gallery in Montreal. Then they began supporting a friend at end of life, and their plan changed. Irritated by the dull hospital rooms, they dreamed of an environment that could help treat patients, by placing artwork in various locations. They injected the *healing environment* philosophy in more than 102 health care institutions throughout Canada, France and Algeria. Acting as managers, consultants and curators, they interfaced between donors and hospitals, installing 14,500 pieces in two decades. It's not surprising that they have been called *Art Doctors*.

Heartfelt choices

And things began to happen. In 2013, to thank François and François-Xavier for their support, Simon Blais and Sylvie Cataford offered about thirty artworks. This marked the start of the Sacré-Cœur Hospital art collection. Dr. Malo and the Art for Healing Foundation set the basis for this collection, by establishing a permanent Visual Arts Committee. It includes representatives from various CIUSSS departments and our Foundation. From its early days, the Committee has also counted on the expertise of gallery owner Éric Devlin, who acts as art advisor for the other members of the Committee.

Digression

The word *curator* designates both someone who organizes exhibits and the person in charge of preserving the collection. From the Latin, *curator*, *curare*, it comes from the same root as *care* in the medical sense. Curators are responsible for collections. "They look after preservation, research, development, and dissemination of the collections."².

Conservation

Today, the Sacré-Cœur Hospital Collection is part of the Montréal Sacré-Cœur Hospital Foundation, under the watchful eye of attorney Marie-Claude Tellier, director of major donations and planned giving. She is supported by the Visual Arts Committee of the Montréal Sacré-Cœur Hospital Foundation.

In some ways, Me. Tellier acts as the collection manager, while Dr. Jean-Luc Malo is the equivalent to guest curator. What is amazing about the Collection's history is that, 10 years later, the initial players are still active in the project. The philosophy at the basis of creation of the Collection is still relevant: "Presentation of the Collection in spaces of the Montreal Sacré-Cœur Hospital and the Albert-Prévost Mental Health Hospital is designed to improve the quality of spaces for patients as well as for employees and visitors. Art is an essential element of life and can, in its way, contribute to healing while creating a health care and work environment that is vibrant and comforting." 3

The composition of the Collection is based on guidelines. The majority of the works are by professional Quebec artists, providing them with increased visibility in a government institution. Work by Canadian and foreign artists may also be included.

At its start it comprised 30 pieces, today the Collection totals more than 350. An important fact: 100% of the artwork is on exhibit. Only works on paper: engravings, mixed techniques, ink and gouache, watercolours, calligraphy, collages, photographs, drawings. Figurative and abstract. All framed under plexiglass to facilitate maintenance during epidemic and contagious situations. The Policy also takes into account the hospital environment where works are exhibited. No political, religious or explicitly sexual references, nor violence. The uses and activities of the spaces means the artwork cannot be unwieldy or too fragile. Including works by about a hundred artists, the Collection

presents the history of Quebec art over the last 60 years. Founding members of modernity: Pellan and Riopelle rub shoulders with Barbeau, Daudelin, Derouin, Dickson, Gaucher, Giguère, Hurtubise, Juneau, Lacroix, McEwen, Molinari, Robert, Savoie, Simonin, Snow, Vincent. Contemporary art is not forgotten, with art by Geneviève Cadieux, Edward Burtynsy, Catherine Farish, Dominique Goupil, Pascal Grandmaison.

Conclusion

Innumerable studies show the benefits of art in health care environments, particularly with regard to the patient experience: positive effect on mindsets, reduction of stress, reduction in pain, etc.⁴ For the last 10 years, the Collection has "treated" and supported patients, staff and visitors. As Sylvie Cataford explains: "During many visits in 2022 spent at the bedside of my mother in Sacré-Cœur Hospital we realized that well-decorated walls made all the difference. Patients and staff notice the artwork that is part of their daily experience. It's good work. And a great way to make art known and appreciated."

To the founders, donors, artists and to the Montréal Sacré-Cœur Hospital Foundation: many thanks. And to all of you: patients, staff and visitors, listen to what the artwork has to tell you, with or without a stethoscope.

2023: A great year for planned giving

This year was excellent with regards to planned giving, through legacy gifts (in wills) and donations of shares. As a result, in 2023, the Foundation received:

16 legacy gifts, for a total of \$1.25 million

25 donations of shares, with a total value of \$460,000

In 2023, the contribution of planned giving to Foundation income was significant; it will allow many projects to be completed. Whether through legacy donations or donations of shares, the value can vary from a few hundred dollars to several hundreds of thousands of dollars, even to more than a million dollars.

Who are the people who bequest donations through their will?

In many cases, it is a patient or the relative of a patient who wants to support the Foundation and the Hospital after having received treatment. In other cases, someone chooses to make a major donation to support a specific department or research project.

That was the case of Gaëtan Boulianne, who made a bequest of several hundreds of thousands of dollars earmarked for Parkinson's disease research at our Centre for Advanced Research in Sleep Medicine.

Sometimes, people without children or family decide to leave a percentage, or even the entirety, of their assets to the Foundation, through their will. In 2023, that was the case of Louise Belhumeur, Alain Aubin and Michel Derycke. These altruistic actions deserve to be highlighted. Patients of Sacré-Cœur Hospital will certainly benefit.



Make health part of your legacy

Donating through your will didn't used to be very popular, but is increasingly seen as a great way to support a cause you think is important. As shown by the numbers above, the benefits of this kind of donation are significant and provide real support to research and to various departments of the Hospital. A portion of these donations is transferred to the Foundation endowment fund, helping to sustain it in perpetuity.

If a donor notifies the Foundation in advance that they intend to make a donation through their will, we can acknowledge the decision; it also allows us to better plan the future of the organization. In order to help us know who in our community plans to make this kind of donation to the Foundation, we have created a short declaration form, which can be found on our web site. It only takes a few minutes to fill out the form, and the information is very important to us!


In memoriam



Yvon Martin: 30 years as a volunteer director with the Foundation

Thanks to benefactors, he was able to deliver containers filled with medication and books for young people to Madagascar schools. What a wonderful example!

Mr. Martin received accolades throughout his career. Still, our Foundation felt it was essential that we highlight, during our annual gala, how important his support and devotion to improving care are to our cause.
